

# How Can We Prepare Students for an Unknown Future?

In the mid-1990's Microsoft started an encyclopedia called Encarta. They employed all the right incentives. They paid professionals to write and edit thousands of articles. Well compensated managers oversaw the whole thing to make sure it came in on budget and on time. A few years later another encyclopedia started — A different model — Do it for fun. No one gets paid a cent or a euro or a yen. Do it because you like to do it. Now 10 years ago if you had talked to an economist ... anywhere ... and said "Hey, I've got these different models for creating an encyclopedia — If they went head to head who would win? 10 years ago you could not have found a single, sober economist anywhere on planet earth who would have predicted the Wikipedia model. This is the Titanic battle between these two approaches. This is the Ali-Frazier of motivation, right, this is the Thrilla in Manila, alright — Intrinsic motivators vs extrinsic motivators — Autonomy, Mastery & Purpose versus Carrots & sticks – And who wins — Intrinsic motivation, autonomy, mastery and purpose — in a Knockout.




The same approach is used for homework. Students on 6 Service have so many different ways to keep track of their homework. Many students will personalize their approach, while others may still need some guidance.

"Daily Agendas" (a great place for absent students to see what they may have missed) and "Upcoming Due Dates".




#### 6 Service Week at a Glance

Some students still prefer other ways to keep track of their homework. Some students use their **Daily Planner** others set up a document for themselves on their iPad and update it continuously. If a student is struggling with finding a way, we can then work together to help them find success.

## Guardianship in the Google Classroom

Adding parents as guardians in the Google Classroom will give them a weekly overview of the topics discussed in the class for the week. This may be great for parents who just need to occasionally check in. However, it is not a very helpful tool when in comes to day to day tasks. If you wish to receive a Guardian invite, please let me know. (Google Guardian invites do work the most consistently with Google emails.)

Another program both parents and students should become familiar with is Home Access Center (HAC). This is the software that you use to check grades and to check for any missing assignments.

Students should receive a HAC login and password before school begins with their registration material. If students are having problems logging in after the first week of school, they should visit the guidance office to check their information.

Many students check HAC and quickly gaze at their percentage. However, it may be beneficial to log specifically in the class and check individual assignments.

If a student or a parent sees a "M" next to the assignment for "Missing", this means I am still looking for the assignment to be turned in.

I do not have a specific late work policy, as I work with each child individually on accomplishing their learning goals. If a student begins to miss an excessive amount of assignments, parents will be contacted to see if we can set some new routines and habits to lead to success.

In working with HAC, **you know your child the best**. I would recommend checking in with HAC once or twice a week. Perhaps even make a set day in the week (ex. Every Thursday) that you check together.

Some students check infrequently and then are surprised by the overwhelming amount of information in HAC for them. Others check too frequently and become almost obsessive.

In the end, we want this to be a **stress free experience**, please help your child set up a system that is best for them.
